9/23: Military Appreciation Day Tailgate & Football Game

W&M Military & Veteran Affairs and Association of 1775 hosted a Military Appreciation Tailgate before the Tribe defeated Maine by a score of 28-3. The tailgate was free and welcomed 200 alumni, W&M ROTC, student veterans, parents, family and friends. The Ground Zero Flag, the U.S. Flag that flew at Ground Zero after the attacks of 9/11 and served three tours in Iraq, was also on display at the tailgate as it makes its way around the country before being officially retired on 11/2/2026 - the 25th Anniversary of the last time it flew in the rubble at Ground Zero. The flag can be seen in the photograph below and W&M attendees had the chance to sign the book documenting the flag's journey. Special thank you to Flip DeCamp for organizing the flag's display.

IN HIS OWN WORDS

The decision to pursue a legal career began when I had the opportunity to work alongside a Navy JAG on deployment. I found their work fascinating and decided to learn more about law school. After that deployment, I scheduled a visit with the closest law school, William & Mary Law. During my visit, I was struck by just how supportive the students and faculty were, and I knew this was where I wanted to begin my legal career.

However, getting into law school is hard! I applied and was rejected by W&M two years in a row. Despite these setbacks, I continued to engage with students and knew that this was where I wanted to earn my J.D. My journey to W&M took a circuitous route and involved studying for the LSAT between missile tubes on a submarine and writing admissions essays in Afghanistan. After re-taking the LSAT (several times), I was admitted to W&M as a member of the class of 2025.

Leaving the Navy to start law school was intimidating. Having been away from academics for several years, I was nervous about returning to school. However, during summer orientation, Professor Michael Dick organized a meeting to introduce the members of my class to second and third-year law students and the various resources W&M offers to its military and veteran population. Between social gatherings hosted by Professor Dick and networking events organized by the Military and Veterans Law Society, the W&M students, faculty, and alumni have helped ease the transition to law school.

Despite leaving active duty, I continued to have a strong desire to serve. I combined my interest in the law and desire to support fellow servicemembers by working under Professor Dick and Professor Caleb Stone for the Lewis B. Puller, Jr. Veterans Benefits Clinic. In this role, I had the opportunity to represent clients before the Department of Veterans Affairs to increase their compensation for injuries and illnesses they sustained during their military service. My work at the Puller Clinic supporting fellow veterans has been a challenging and rewarding experience. W&M has allowed me to find a new sense of purpose after leaving the Navy by allowing me to utilize my legal education to support veterans through the Puller Clinic.

Patrick Rogers, '25, was a Navy Electronics Technician who served on active duty for seven years. He was stationed in Virginia Beach, VA, where he provided communications support to a Naval Special Warfare (NSW) unit and completed three overseas deployments. At William & Mary Law, he seeks to combine his professional experience in cybersecurity with his legal career.




11/8: Veterans Day Reception & Book Talk with Brian Morra '78
