

Military and Veteran Student Spotlight



Kate Milenski, '22 IN HER OWN WORDS: Q&A

Kate is a Boatswain's Mate Petty Officer 1st Class serving as Boat Forces Instructor in the U.S. Coast Guard Reserves. She recently graduated in December 2022 with a Bachelor's degree in Kinesiology & Health Sciences and a minor in Psychology. During her time at W&M, she was the Student Veterans of W&M President, served on the W&M Military and Veteran Affairs Internal Steering Committee, was the Toastmasters at William & Mary Founder & President, and was a member of the SALUTE Veterans National Honor Society. She also volunteers at Dream Catchers as an Equine Specialist in Mental Health & Learning.

What is a Boatswain's Mate and what does one do? I have been a Coast Guard Boatswain's Mate for almost ten years. My primary duties at small boat stations have been search and rescue as well as law enforcement. Currently, I am assigned to Training Center Yorktown's Boat Forces Center, where I teach the next generation of Boatswain's Mates about seamanship, search pattern techniques, and emergency response.

Where were you stationed last on active duty? Any historic events happen during that time? My last active duty unit was Station Washington, D.C., where our most prominent mission was protecting Air Force One crossing the Potomac River. My time there was certainly marked by historical events: the funeral of George H.W. Bush, the onset of COVID-19, the creation of the Black Lives Matter Plaza, and the inauguration of President Joseph Biden. I was even recalled on January 6th, 2021, and served as the station's duty officer for the following 72 hours.

Why did you choose to apply to W&M? I chose to apply to William & Mary because I had attended Northern Virginia Community College while stationed in Washington, D.C., and I did not want to lose any credits crossing state lines. Also, I was accepted into William & Mary during Spring 2020 and deferred until Fall 2021 when my Coast Guard active duty contract was up . I deeply appreciate the honored deferral despite COVID-19, as it gave me a sense of certainty despite the otherwise tumultuous times.

What was it like to transition from active duty to the USCG Reserve while also going to school? Transitioning from such a high operational tempo into the classrooms of William & Mary was certainly difficult. I felt very lost and talked to very few people as I went through orientation and the first week of classes. My trajectory changed when I was introduced to the Office of Student Veteran Engagement, and I felt much more confident that I belonged.

There is a lot of research about the civil-military divide. But you have bridged it a lot, meeting other students, faculty, and staff where they are. How were you able to do that? I think approaching people non judgmentally and actively listening are big reasons I can do that. It allows me to really put myself in others' shoes to understand their goals and how I could help them using my skills and connections.

You have a broad and deep interest in health and wellness. Why is that field so important to you? Both my parents are pharmacists, so healthcare and taking care of others were a big part of my household growing up. I knew it was important to me when I first learned about taking care of others in a medical capacity through a Babysitter's First Aid in 2007.

What's next? I am applying to medical school this cycle and hope to advocate for the needs of the military and veteran community in the healthcare community.
