MOU signing between W&M and VDVS

At the Virginia War Memorial on April 24th, W&M's President Katherine Rowe and Virginia Department of Veterans Services (VDVS) Commissioner Daniel Gade signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to partner together for education, outreach, and development opportunities for our Commonwealth military and veteran communities. This partnership between VDVS and W&M will help connect the veteran service members and military families who W&M services to all VDVS's services and will enhance VDVS access to academic and research expertise as well as facilities and programs offered at W&M for military and veterans. Several of our faculty are engaged in research projects for VDVS.

Our goal is to maximize the efficiency and productivity of existing resources, personnel, and data infrastructure to bring enhanced veteran services to the Commonwealth of Virginia by improving the pipeline between W&M, Veterans, and the Commonwealth of Virginia

MOA between W&M and VA



William & Mary signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs Office of VHA Innovation Ecosystem (VHA IE). The MoA sets forth a structure in which both entities will work together to advance and improve the quality of life for our Nation's Veterans. Under this new partnership, W&M and VHA IE will work collaboratively during the upcoming W&M Flourishing Through Life Transitions program. VHA leaders will be on campus to work with the Flourishing Through Life Transitions cohort in early June.

Events Recap

3rd Annual National Security Conference

The April 6 National Security Conference "From Theory to Practice: Fostering Climate Resilience for a More Secure World" brought together the entire university as well as outside practitioners and highlighted the ways academia can help with global problems. Of the approximately 200 attendees, more than 120 came from outside the university, which showcased the way Whole of Government Center of Excellence fulfills its role as a convener. Along with keynote addresses from Retired Admirals Foggo, Dean of the Center for Military Strategy and Phillips, head of the Maritime Administration, the conference also featured panels highlighting the role climate plays in environmental justice as well as student presentations. Planning will soon begin for 2024 and we look forward to expanding the breadth and reach.

Rebecca (Becca) Doughtery, M.Ed. '23

IN HER OWN WORDS

"So, where are you from?" All 27 years of my life, I've lost count of how many times, at how many new schools, how many new friends have asked me this question. Well, where am I from? Typically, I jokingly respond "well I am from the United States.

As an Army brat, how should I answer? I could say "well I was born at Ft. Wainwright, Alaska, but then I moved to Ft. Campbell, Kentucky. I also lived at Ft. Eustis, Virginia a few times, and I spent quite some time at Ft. Drum, New York. Despite the responses and the anticipation for the dreaded question, I embraced my identity as an Army Brat. Being an Army Brat shaped the person I am today more than anything else. My father served 30 years as an aviation mechanic, serving as a Drill Sergeant and retiring as a Command Sergeant Major and I am proud to be his daughter.

While I was also proud of the "military brat" identity, I could see that the military lifestyle was draining. My lived experience ignited a passion to pursue a mental health career that serves the military affiliated population. My dream was to work at the Department of Veteran Affairs Medical, providing mental health care to veterans and their families. I fell in love with my husband, Brent, who decided to pursue a career in the Army. Upon his enlistment and departure to One Station Unit Training, I found out I was pregnant with our son, Grayson. However, I was still pursuing higher education by attending the local community college to complete an Associate of Science degree. This was my next step toward my goal as a mental health services practitioner. Despite the difficulty juggling these newly acquired roles, I still had my own mission to accomplish.

The label "military spouse" was placed onto my identity while stationed at Ft. Bragg, North Carolina. While I didn't embrace it by attending any Family Readiness Group meetings or wearing the "mil-spouse" gear, I did amplify it by continuing to pursue MY dream. In December 2020, while watching our son Grayson climb under the Christmas tree, I googled mental health programs that I could apply. I stumbled across <u>W&M's Clinical Mental Health Counseling program</u> that specialized in serving the Military & Veteran population. After reading the description, I knew I needed to apply and in March of 2021 I received an acceptance letter.

In the fall semester of 2021, I walked onto this historic campus and was ready to truly amplify my identity as a military-affiliated individual and give back to the community and culture that shaped me. After my first academic year, I was given the opportunity to serve as a graduate assistant in the Office of Student Veteran Engagement (OSVE) with the Director, Charlie Foster, where my work there enabled me to receive tuition assistance. As an Army Brat and a Military Spouse with a child, I saw gaps in services to those populations at W&M. I worked diligently to include military connected groups during my time as the OSVE graduate assistant, which helped me connect to others here who are like me, who wear the military brat and military spouse identities.

As I prepare now to walk across the stage at W&M's Commencement and leave my formal duties in the W&M milvet community, I will forever cherish the people I have met, the experiences the student veterans have shared with me, and the opportunity to see the growth of every student veteran who walks through the OSVE door.

Becca Dougherty is graduating on May 19th, 2023 with an M.Ed in Clinical Mental Health & Military/Veterans Counseling. Becca recently accepted a full-time postion where she will provide direct services in a state facility working for community focused mental health care.
