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
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Recap of Events

Military and Veteran Student Spotlight



Patrick Green, MBA 23'
IN HIS OWN WORDS

I loved being an Infantry Officer in the Army and could not imagine my life outside of the military. I knew that service was core to who I am, and I could only see it through the lens of my military career.

So what changed my trajectory?

While I was serving as a budget planner at Fort Eustis, I began to read a lot about project management, change management, and thinking differently to solve problems. As I grew in that position, I thought about where the next ten years of my career would take me and how the past ten years had influenced my family life. With encouragement from my spouse, I started entertaining what life outside the Army might look like. As I researched options, it became clear that I would need an MBA to have the jobs I wanted. So, I starting looking at Yellow Ribbon Schools and Military Affiliated programs. As I did some research, I read that they were standing up a new Center for Military Transition at William & Mary. I knew that this was the kind of support I needed to make such a drastic change in my life.

I applied and interviewed with admissions at the Raymond A. Mason School of Business, and to be real, I was VERY intimidated about starting school at William & Mary. I only took statistics in college, and I had very limited knowledge of anything business. The Summer MBA Bootcamp program was what I needed to confirm that I could learn something completely different and it boosted my confidence about being successful in the program.

The Center for Military Transition has also been an invaluable part of my transition from active duty to civilian. The CMT provided a place for me to feel comfortable as a student, and helped me connect with other Veterans who were having similar experiences. JD Due and the CMT also provided one-of-a-kind leadership experiences like small group meetings with military alumni, certification courses like the Project Management Professional course, and support at the MBA Veteran's Conference.

When I became a student again, I was unsure of what service could look like in this time of learning and transition. I have found different ways to serve and give back as a student at the Mason School: I am a member of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion committee, a student peer mentor, and also the GA for the CMT. I also assist the teams I am on for projects and classes by sharing my leadership experiences. I often fall into the role of project manager and stretch myself to help others in my group have the opportunity to learn and practice those skills too.

Patrick is currently a Full-Time MBA Candidate with a focus in Finance and Consulting. He is passionate about project management, cross-functional team leadership, collaborative problem solving, and working with international organizations.
